What was the last time music was really, really exciting for you?

Last night! Was out with friends and the DJ happened to be fantastic.

What's the last album you bought that you're enjoying?

Probably Paramore's "Living on a Prayer."

Everyone has their 'OOPS!' moment on stage. What was yours?

I had my piano stand under a mic stand and went to move it. It catapulted the mic stand so far into the grid now and almost injured a girl down there. The whole crowd went "oooooooooooooooooooo" all at the same time, clearly scolding.

What is your guilty pleasure band?

Je-eb.

What's the weirdest thing that's ever happened to you?

I was sleeping in a plane and a man with rubber gloves pulled me out of a toilet. It just kept getting weirder after that.

If you were a superhero what famous musician would be your arch-enemy and why?

How long have you been playing and what was your first instrument?

Since I was a little kid I'd always had a fascination with the piano, but my mom tried to get me to play violin at age 3, and guess that was technically my first.

What's the greatest thing that's ever been said about your music?

I have lots of wonderful things everyday for which I'm quite grateful. The greatest thing to me are those dealing with my music having touched someone else's life in a truly meaningful way.

When you get bad reviews, do you let them get to you?

Gratefully most of my reviews are positive and written with such clarity, but yes, I got a bad review recently by a reviewer who said "I hate when artists don't play their own instruments." Obviously, the reviewer was extremely misinformed. For all of my songs I am not only the singer and writer but I also play work of the instruments: Guitar, Piano, Bass, Guitar, all the drum work and engineering, and I also produce, mix and master each track entirely by myself. I am the opposite of what this particular reviewer was attacking.

What's the song you're most proud of writing?

I think "Fool In The Middle" is one of the more clever and poignant ones. (Listen below.)

If you could take back a song you've released because you're not excited about it now in hindsight, which one would it be?

Well neither of the songs I've actually released I don't have those regrets. But I do have some unreleased songs that I've spent a long time writing, recording and producing which I wasn't too thrilled about following their completion. Once I feel that a song can't make the cut to be released it goes in my "trash" which can only be opened after I die, and they are not to be included in the playlist which is to be played at my funeral and which can be found on my third order "Parasite."

What's your favorite artist and album?

Now that's a tough one. I guess if to be measured in terms of the tangible impact they've had on my life in the whole history of music either Nirvana's "Nevermind" or Pink Floyd's "The Wall."
